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Statement of the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Regional Affairs

I am pleased to report to Congress the accomplishments of the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA), U.S. Department of Commerce, for Fiscal Year 2017. During the year, EDA continued to work collaboratively with public- and private-sector partners to support economic growth and job creation in regions throughout the United States. Through our comprehensive grants programs providing support for infrastructure, disaster recovery, economic adjustment, planning, trade adjustment assistance, access to capital and technical assistance, EDA partners with communities throughout the economic development lifecycle, from planning through implementation. With this flexible set of tools, EDA is able to support a wide range of community needs.

In Fiscal Year 2017, EDA invested approximately \$289.1 million in 815 locally-driven economic development projects nationwide. These investments included approximately \$136.4 million in Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance construction projects that communities identified as critical infrastructure enhancements to ensure their long-term competitiveness. Grantees expect these investments will help create or retain approximately 25,233 jobs and generate over \$3.4 billion in private investment.

EDA also supported economic development planning that helped communities make good decisions regarding their long-term economic growth. In FY 2017, EDA made 430 awards to regions and communities, providing them with close to \$32.2 million to develop such plans.

To ensure that our programs help entrepreneurs gain the tools they need to move their ideas and inventions from idea to market, we have also worked hard to solidify our Regional Innovation Strategies (RIS) program to foster greater entrepreneurship all across America in both urban and rural communities.

The 2017 RIS Program was appropriated \$17 million to support two unique grant opportunities, the i6 Challenge and Seed Fund Support (SFS) Grants competition. The i6 Challenge is a leading national initiative designed to support the creation of centers for innovation and entrepreneurship that increase the rate at which innovation, ideas, intellectual property, and research are translated into products, services, viable companies, and ultimately, jobs. Through the SFS Grants competition, EDA provides funding for technical assistance to support the creation, launch, or expansion of equity-based, cluster-focused seed funds that invest regionally-managed risk capital in regionally-based startups with a potential for high growth.

EDA also plays a role helping communities to recover from sudden and severe economic dislocations whether from changes to the underlying economy or the shock of a natural disaster. In FY 2017, EDA began its response to the historic natural disasters impacting the country including Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria and the wildfires in California among others.

At the core of EDA's economic recovery approach is the concept of integrating economic development resources from across the Federal government to help communities to optimize actions and achieve better long-term economic development outcomes. EDA has formalized this integration process with the creation of the Economic Development Integration business practice.

The Fiscal Year 2017 Annual Report provides an overview of EDA's work and contemporary accomplishments in these areas.

OVERVIEW

EDA MISSION

To lead the Federal economic development agenda by promoting innovation and competitiveness, preparing American regions for growth and success in the worldwide economy.

The U.S. Economic Development Administration's (EDA) investment policy is designed to establish a foundation for sustainable job growth and the building of durable regional economies throughout the United States. This foundation builds upon two key economic drivers - innovation and regional collaboration. Innovation is key to global competitiveness, new and better jobs, a resilient economy, and the attainment of national economic goals. Regional collaboration is essential for economic recovery and prosperity because regions that work together to leverage resources and use their strengths to overcome weaknesses will fare better in a global economy than those that do not. EDA encourages its partners around the country to develop new ideas and creative approaches to address rapidly evolving economic conditions.

EDA'S ROLE

As the only Federal government agency focused exclusively on economic development, EDA currently plays a role in facilitating regional economic development efforts in communities across the nation.

Guided by the basic principle that sustainable economic development should be locally-driven, EDA works directly with communities and regions to help them build the capacity for economic development based on local business conditions and needs. EDA's grant investments in planning, technical assistance, and infrastructure construction are designed to leverage existing regional assets to support the implementation of economic development strategies that make it easier for businesses to start and grow.

EDA's flexible programs and structure enable nimble operations and allow for innovation and responsiveness to changing economic needs and conditions faced by its local and State government partners. Grants made under these programs are designed to leverage existing regional assets to support the implementation of economic development strategies that advance new ideas and creative approaches to advance economic prosperity in distressed communities.

EDA provides economic development financial assistance to communities so they can encourage innovation and entrepreneurship in a way that works best for them. Through its network of regionally-based staff and portfolio of flexible grant tools, EDA helps communities experiencing economic distress take control of their future and position themselves for economic prosperity and resiliency. In addition, EDA leads the integration of economic development resources from all sources, including Federal, State, and local, to achieve better outcomes for communities across America.

EDA has verified the data through a reconciliation process, conducted annually, between EDA's grant management systems and the Department of Commerce's accounting system. Birmingham, Alabama - The State of Alabama's largest city, Birmingham has long been a center for steel and iron manufacturing and the coal industry, but over the past several decades, these industries have contracted resulting in substantial job loss. According to industry estimates over 4,500 coal-related jobs were lost in the Birmingham region since 2012 alone. Despite these substantial, industry-specific job losses, many new jobs were added to the regional economy in the rapidly growing biomedical cluster. In fact, since 2010, over 3,000 new jobs have been added. One of the leading biomedical firms in Birmingham is the Southern Research Institute (SRI). Since 1941, SRI has conducted research and development in many areas including: drug discovery/development, engineering, energy and environmental services.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$397,665 in Economic Adjustment Assistance through Assistance to Coal Communities funds to SRI to fund the renovation of the Institute's Cancer Cause and Prevention Facility in Jefferson County, Alabama and to help aid in the advancement of SRI's mission. The grant was used to modernize 34,000 square feet of the facility, which will allow them to conduct more extensive medical research and expand their capabilities.

These improvements will help expand SRI's drug development unit allowing them to test medicines designed to combat various forms of cancer, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), Alzheimer's, diabetes, kidney disease, Parkinson's and tuberculosis. Today, SRI employs over 500 scientists and is an industry leader in the commercialization of new and improved products. As a direct result of the expansion, SRI is expected to add 17 staff members at the new facility.

St. Paul Island, AK - This local economy depends on crab and halibut fishing and seafood processing as the most important economic sector in the community. However, in recent times the decreasing allocation of the crab totals allowable for catch, on which its economy depends, has negatively impacted the local economy. Further, the fishing industry in the area is in need of a facility to service fishing vessels. Presently these services are conducted without the benefit of an enclosed facility which is an inefficient and risky way to manage the needs of businesses in the area.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$1.5 million in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to help create a vessel service, repair and marine supply store facility which will expand the commercial fisheries beyond locally caught seafood. The new facility will help diversify the local economy by enabling the commercial fishing fleet to expand to other types of marine species allowing for more exports and industry expansion.

The project is anticipated to create 73 jobs, retain 135 jobs and attract \$22.65 million in private investment. As a result of the Aleut Community developing the marine service, repair and supply center, local fishermen are expanding their fishing businesses. The Aleut Community Tribal members are expanding their skills in marine repair such as welding and electronics and as a result, local retail sales have shown an early increase.

Pago Pago, AS - Historically, the economy of American Samoa has been heavily dependent on two local economic pillars: the local government and canneries. However, in late 2016, the Samoa Tuna Processors suspended its operations, effectively shutting down. As a direct result, more than 700 employees were laid off, with ripple effects in employment felt throughout the American Samoa economy.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$78,000 in Partnership Planning funds to the American Samoan government to support the development of a new Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), which will bring together the public and private sectors in the creation of an economic development roadmap to diversify and strengthen the regional economy.

The CEDS will assist American Samoa in identifying potential opportunities and projects to help the displaced workers transition to temporary work or training in the short-term, as well as develop long-term strategies for economic diversification.

Sahuarita, AZ - The Town of Sahuarita's economy is heavily dependent on the mining industry. The mining industry employed approximately 1,300 people and had a total impact of over 3,600 direct and indirect jobs in the region. In 2016, a local mining company announced a reduction in operations which would affect over 1,000 jobs and severely impact the mining dependent regional economy. In addition, 560 employees were laid off due to economic fluctuations which had a severe impact on the community. In response, the town recognized that it needs to diversify its economy and reduce its reliance on mining due to the cyclical nature of the industry.

In July 2017, EDA invested \$3 million in Public Works funds to the Town of Sahuarita to construct a 32,000 square foot, multi-tenant manufacturing center that will provide the necessary infrastructure for the expansion and growth of an emerging technology cluster. The center's amenities include private and shared office spaces, meeting and conference rooms, a manufacturing area, a warehouse, a dry and wet laboratory and loading dock space. Sahuarita Advanced Manufacturing and Technology Center (SAMTEC) will help further technological innovation and advanced manufacturing and increase the commercialization of developed products.

The EDA grant will help provide a flexible high technology space for new and expanding businesses to mitigate the impacts of recent local job losses in the mining industry. Several companies have expressed interest in locating in the SAMTEC. These include Hydronalix, a leading developer of technology products for maritime robotics and Control Vision, Inc., an optical and control systems company, among other prospective companies. It is anticipated that SAMTEC will create 75 new jobs, retain 31 jobs and leverage \$500,000 in private investment. This will lead to the diversification of the regional economy while reducing reliance on the mining industry.

Clark County, AR - Established in 2010 to develop a regional approach to attract and retain high-wage jobs, the Southwest Arkansas Regional Intermodal Authority (SWARIA) developed intermodal facilities to attract and retain industrial users. Clark County, where SWARIA is located, lost one of its largest employers, ALCOA. Five counties in the region were affected due to the large displacement of jobs.

In October 2017, EDA invested \$1.3 million in Public Works funds to SWARIA and Clark County to fund the construction of a public trans-load facility and cross dock in Phase II of the project, the design and construction of an industrial rail spur and rail access at the Clark County Industrial Park. Completion of the project will help expand labor market opportunities in Clark, Montgomery, Nevada, Pike and Dallas counties. Among the industrial users in the park is a paper manufacturer which plans to build a pulp mill within the industrial park. The paper manufacturer anticipates creating 250 direct jobs in logging, trucking and forestry industries across the county. Phase II will also allow for economic growth and attract industrial businesses to the region.

Yuba County, CA - Yuba County stretches from the fertile Sacramento River in the West to the foothills of the Sierra Nevada Mountains in the East. Long dependent upon agriculture, the county suffers from chronic poverty and high unemployment and has struggled to diversify its economy or create high-skilled, high-wage jobs.

The Yuba County airport needed a taxiway to accommodate a growing local business and had limited resources to build it. Rice Aircraft Services, a veteran owned helicopter rebuilding and refurbishing business also needed access to the airport and a taxiway to get the helicopters near the control tower for testing. Yuba County, with assistance from the Yuba Sutter Economic Development District, applied to EDA for assistance to build a 3,500-foot taxiway to run parallel to the runway.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$926,795 in Public Works funds to construct the taxiway. After EDA's investment, Rice Aircraft has committed to creating 96 new jobs. In addition, the taxiway created new opportunities for other aviation related businesses in the area which are now planning expansions and which will create even more high skilled jobs. The region is near Beale Air Force Base and home to a significant number of veterans with aviation related skill sets. The creation of jobs specifically geared to skilled local veterans will become a catalyst for the region and the local economy.

San Miguel County, CO - Rural western Colorado is heavily dependent on coal mining, an industry currently experiencing large job losses in the region. The announced closure of a local coal fired power plant will leave 55 workers unemployed and result in the loss of 65 percent of local taxes. This job loss and loss of tax receipts will negatively affect area schools, medical clinics, libraries, public services and the overall local economy; leading to the conclusion that the region needs to develop a more diversified and resilient economy.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$760,025 in Economic Adjustment Assistance, through Assistance to Coal Communities funds, to purchase a 20-year Indefeasible Right of Use for fiber strands in order to complete infrastructure required to deliver broadband services to communities in San Miguel County. Because the population is sparse, broadband providers have little incentive to promote better service, and there is limited opportunity for competition among providers. Improved broadband service is key to creating new economic development opportunities in the region. The availability of connecting to world markets will facilitate entrepreneurship, encourage new businesses to enter the market, and help existing businesses looking to grow.

EDA's investment will support this rural region of the State to improve accessibility and competitiveness and deliver broadband access to communities in isolated areas. Access to high

speed internet will help this rural, coal-reliant region of Colorado become more diversified and resilient by encouraging business development that will lead to the creation of jobs and assist in the area's economic recovery from the coal industry job losses.

The Capital Region Council of Governments (CRCOG) was awarded \$125,176 in EDA Short-Term Planning funding to develop a 38 municipality CEDS for the Capital Region of Connecticut. As a result of a State-led redistricting of the Connecticut planning organizations, the Capital Region will be comprised of three existing regional planning regions: Metro Hartford Alliance (30 municipalities), Central Connecticut EDA EDD (4 municipalities), and Northeastern Connecticut Economic Development Partnership (4 municipalities). The CRCOG had obtained appropriate authorizations from the Commissioner of the CT Department of Economic and Community Development (CT-DECD) and the Secretary of the CT Office of Policy and Management (CT-OPM) to establish itself as the Regional Economic Development District (REDD) for the Capitol Planning Region. Under Connecticut law, a REDD is the entity authorized to prepare a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) within each of the State's nine planning regions. Both the MetroHartford Alliance and Central CT Economic Development Alliance have submitted letters of support for CRCOG's role in preparing the CEDS for the expanded region. The CRCOG-prepared CEDS is expected to supersede the current MetroHartford CEDS and the Central Connecticut CEDS.

As a result of a 2014 State-led redistricting of the State of Connecticut's Economic Development District boundaries, the Capital region will expand from 30 to 38 municipalities, bringing an additional 200,000 people to the region. The Central CT EDD, which is the only EDA EDD in the region, will cease to exist if the CRCOG is designated as an EDA EDD.

The 38 municipality CEDS will create a new vision for the growing region in a changing economy. The completion of the CEDS will enable CRCOG to request EDA EDD designation in the Spring of 2018 and allow the State of Connecticut to officially dissolve the Central Connecticut EDD (EDA EDD). The completed CEDS for the Capital Region will replace the existing Central Connecticut and Metro Hartford EDA approved CEDS.

Wilmington, DE - The merger of DuPont and Dow into a single company and their separation into three new corporations has created a major economic impact in Delaware with the layoff of 1,700 highly skilled positions in the Wilmington area. After losing a significant amount of jobs over the years to plant closures and layoffs, the State needed ways to address and improve economic growth and opportunities in the region. As part of the process, DuPont, the State of Delaware and other partners collaborated to address the urgent need to retain the scientific workforce and provide new entrepreneurial opportunities as large corporations contract and reduce their workforces.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$3,000,000 in Public Works funds to support the renovation and retrofitting of a 135,000 square foot office space in an existing building on the campus of the DuPont Experimental Station to create a science incubator and multi-tenant collaboration space. The updated space will serve as the new home of the Delaware Innovation Space, Inc. (DISI) – a technology and science incubator that will house up to 40 early stage conceptual companies. The investment will improve the physical infrastructure to meet the needs of increased private investment in potential companies.

The DISI facility will house entrepreneurs and growing science firms that will create jobs and leverage intellectual property, much of it transferred to workers displaced by the merger. This investment is anticipated to create approximately 657 new jobs and generate \$80,000,000 in private investment.

The District of Columbia is home to many national organizations that contribute to economic success in areas across the country, including the International Economic Development Council (IEDC). IEDC is a non-profit, non-partisan membership organization serving economic developers.

As part of EDA's economic recovery assistance efforts in FY 2017 for communities impacted by Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria, EDA provided three grants, totaling \$650,000, from the EDA Austin, Philadelphia and Atlanta Regional Offices to IEDC to support the coordination and development of a Volunteer Assistance Program for Hurricane Impacted Communities. These investments focused on quickly assessing economic recovery needs of the disaster impacted communities in Texas, Florida, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands and deploying experienced recovery and resiliency volunteers to affected communities. The program helped economic developers, communities and regional governments locate and access necessary resources, as well as build capacity to maintain the momentum required for long-term disaster recovery.

Treasure Coast, FL - This region was among the hardest hit areas in the State of Florida and in the U.S following the 2008 economic downturn and housing market crisis. Historically, St. Lucie County's economy has been dominated by three broad industry sectors – tourism, construction and real estate. These industries have largely been responsible for generating the county's volatile unemployment rates (lower than the national average in a strong economy and higher than the national average in a soft economy). The St. Lucie County Board of County Commissioners placed an increased focus on long-term economic development and diversification efforts in their economic plans in order to reverse the tide and shift the economy and workforce in a positive direction. This strategic plan is also aligned with the State's economic goals to recruit businesses to Florida, create more jobs and foster economic growth.

In February 2017, EDA invested \$1,500,000 in Public Works funds to the St. Lucie County Board of County Commissioners to fund the construction of a new hanger and related road infrastructure at the Treasure Coast International Airport (TCIA), which is located in an active Foreign Trade Zone. The TCIA expansion project includes the construction of a 30,000 to 50,000 square foot pre-engineered metal building hangar large enough to accommodate two 747 aircrafts. This project allows TCIA to greatly enhance its growth and development as a dedicated regional hub for commercial aviation Maintenance, Repair and Overhaul (MRO) and related aviation industries. The increase in capacity at TCIA along with construction of the new hangar will allow the region to meet current demands and further solidify the Treasure Coast region as a major hub for these industries.

The new facility will leverage the airport's regional assets - available land, established infrastructure (water, sewer, power), proximity to transportation networks, including U.S. 1 and Interstate 95, a Foreign Trade Zone and an existing base of twelve MRO companies - to advance the creation of long-term, high-wage jobs in the sustainable civil aviation maintenance industry. According to recipient estimates, including commitments received from two MRO companies, the TCIA Expansion Project will create 123 new jobs along with \$810,000 in private investment at the project site.

Banks and Jackson Counties, GA - The population of Northeast Georgia located in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains has long suffered from high rates of unemployment, low educational attainment and extremely low per capita income. Addressing these long-term and deeply ingrained challenges is not easy, nor are there any quick solutions. Through the thoughtful and aggressive actions of local leadership from the counties of Banks and Jackson, efforts to recruit and secure the location of several national and international firms by taking advantage of regional assets such as available land, high quality of life and abundant natural resources have proven successful economic development strategies. One such example is the recent expansion of an international agriculture business firm in the region. The company's headquarters are located in France and it is also the first tenant to locate in the 124-acre Banks Crossing Business Park.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$1,000,000 in Public Works funds that will help construct a pretreatment facility intended to treat waste from the food manufacturing plant before it enters into the city's collection system. The project also received additional assistance from the Georgia Mountains Regional Commission.

As a result of this project, it is estimated that the company will create nearly 100 jobs and privately invest \$50 million in facilities, machinery and equipment representing a substantial foreign direct investment in rural America.

Hagåtña, GU - Guam serves as a major shipping and commercial hub for many of the smaller island nations in the Micronesia region of the Western Pacific. While Guam's economy has strengths, it also suffers from low per capita income and low job growth. The area is particularly vulnerable to natural hazards, such as typhoons, tropical cyclones, and tsunamis. An update to Guam's economic strategy will not only assist in identifying best approaches to mitigating these challenges, but also assist in preparing for a highly anticipated U.S. military buildup.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$150,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to the Government of Guam to fund the development and implementation of a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for the region, which will bring together the public and private sectors in the creation of an economic development roadmap to diversify and strengthen the regional economy.

This investment will diversify Guam's existing strategy to lay the foundation for economic development, as well as help prepare for the planned increase in military personnel while making it more resilient to natural disasters and economic downturns. The EDA investment will establish an economic development planning framework, process, and strategy that supports private capital investment and job creation in the region.

Oahu, HI - The Waianae community in the western part of the Island of Oahu in Hawaii has experienced significant economic distress. According to the American Community Survey, the Waianae community's unemployment rate was 12.3 percent at the end of 2014. Its per capita income was \$18,710, which was 65 percent of the national per capita income. The region has demonstrated a need for new employment opportunities that provide a more substantial income for the community's workforce. The local population is underserved, as it does not benefit from the region's strongest industries, which are tourism and defense. In an effort to address the economic challenges affecting Waianae, a local community and economic development organization invested in a program designed to create economic opportunities for the community through workforce development. Waianae has pursued development in the agricultural industry through the vocation of farming. The Waianae Community Re-Development Corporation operates a farm that does business under the name MA'O Organic Farms. MA'O Organic Farms trains new farmers and community leaders to co-manage the organizations' operations as they harvest, process, market and distribute over 2 tons of high quality organic fruits and vegetables. In addition to their workforce development efforts, the organization operates a training and education program to teach the vocation of farming to youth from disadvantaged backgrounds. The MA'O Community Food Systems Initiative aims to empower local families and the community to work toward a just, healthy, self-reliant, sustainable and resilient food system for Hawaii.

EDA invested in a partnership with the community granting a \$1.6 million financial assistance award. The funds will support the construction of a 7,500 square-foot building and electrical, water, and telecommunications infrastructure.

The program has enabled the community to become more economically viable through the development of a sustainable industry. In addition, the farming operation has contributed to the growth of the manufacturing sector and has created economic opportunities in the wholesale and retail sectors of the food production and distribution industry. According to the recipient, it is estimated that 200 new jobs will be created as the result of the successfully completed project.

Twin Falls, ID - In 2017, twenty-six counties in Idaho had Federal disaster declarations due to flooding, landslides, and/or mudslides. Idaho is one of the nation's most rural States. As such, its economy is heavily dependent upon agriculture, and is more susceptible to economic fluctuations. Coordinating State-wide economic development planning, including disaster resilience planning, is essential to sustain and grow Idaho's economy. The State is also looking to develop more high-skill, high-wage jobs, as Idaho's per capita income is only 80 percent of the nation's, ranking 45th of all States. Idaho needed a strategy to help diversify and transition its economy from overreliance on resource-based industries, as well as bolstering its resilience to natural disasters and economic downturns.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$95,000 in Partnership Planning funds to Region IV Development Association (RIVDA) to create a State-wide Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the State of Idaho. RIVDA and Idaho's other Economic Development Districts will work with various local, State, Federal and community partners to develop and implement the CEDS.

The Idaho CEDS will reflect the views of a wide range of stakeholders, and help the State effectively strategize how to use its strengths to diversify its economy, grow innovation industries, and help create high-skill, high-wage jobs throughout the State. Implementation of the CEDS will provide increased job opportunities for its residents, help the State improve economic vitality and prepare for natural disasters and bolster its resilience.

Rockford, IL - The City of Rockford has long been an underserved urban community, suffering from urban blight and neglect. The city has a desperate need for a comprehensive set of solutions to the multitude of inter-related problems caused by decades of disinvestment.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,216,435 in Public Works funds to construct the necessary infrastructure to support the redevelopment of the former 22-acre Barber Coleman Factory Campus. The project is one of several Federally funded initiatives that will collectively provide a college, an industrial park and a mixed-use development to benefit the city. The construction of the new mixed-use campus known as the Coleman Village will be anchored by a brand-new Rock Valley College Technical Training Institute. The Institute will offer technical degrees and certificate programs in automotive, welding, fluid power technology/hydraulics, and a host of manufacturing systems. The infrastructure project will be a catalyst for the new workforce training facility as well as the balance of the existing 22-acre site. The new road, water and sewer are the most fundamental and critical components to supporting additional investment.

In conjunction with other Federal, State and locally funded initiatives, the project will provide demand driven workforce training to low and moderate income individuals, address structural poverty, and revitalize the southwest side of Rockford by instituting the adaptive reuse of an

existing manufacturing facility into a useful and productive community asset. The new infrastructure will also support the redevelopment of several other buildings that are targeted for mixed use, commercial and future development opportunities as they arise. The facility will create a dynamic campus that fosters individual and community economic growth through educational, vocational training, and employment in a collaborative atmosphere that promotes a healthy lifestyle and environment.

Terre Haute, IN - Indiana, like the rest of the country, is seeing an increase in the average age of its farm workers. Industries increasingly need to harness available technology to cope with the loss of experienced workers to improve their operational efficiencies and be environmentally friendly. One area where that is occurring involves using geospatial technology to drive efficiencies in crop planting, fertilizing and harvesting. Ivy Tech has gained approval from the Indiana Commission on Higher Education to begin offering a new certificate and degree program to complement current offerings in Agriculture, Electronics, Computer Technology and Diesel Technology programs. The demand for such a program was demonstrated not only through the support and expressed concern from many local agricultural producers but also through the College's own research and analysis.

In April 2017, EDA invested \$1,181,047 in Public Works funds to Ivy Tech Community College of Indiana to help construct a new Precision Agriculture Equipment Technology Center of Excellence located in Terre Haute (Vigo County). The new endeavor will focus on the intersection of geospatial technology and the field crop agricultural industry with a goal of training individuals for this growing sector in the Midwest. The Center of Excellence will attract those lacking the agricultural background to pursue a career in the farming industry and address the talent pipeline needs in the region.

The proposed project will create a training program that will result in technical certificates for agricultural equipment service technicians, precision agriculture specialists and technicians as well as an associate's degree of applied science in precision agriculture equipment technology. The project is anticipated to create 127 jobs and retain 1,186 jobs in the region. Enhancing the use of precision agriculture technology will allow U.S. farmers to increase yields on less ground and reduce the use of environmentally impactful chemicals.

Cedar Rapids, IA - The City of Cedar Rapids, home to over 130,000 people, experienced a devastating flood in 2008 that caused approximately \$2,000,000,000 in damages. PepsiCo Quaker Oats, one of the area's major employers, is still recovering from the flood and faced potential subsequent flooding, causing the company to examine the redevelopment of their current location. A permanent flood control levee was needed to prevent future job losses and significant decreases in revenues due to flooding. The levee, designed to provide protection to the Central Business District of Cedar Rapids would not be effective unless a new water main was relocated.

In July 2017, EDA invested \$1,729,500 in Public Works funds to The City of Cedar Rapids to help support relocation of the water main which was needed for the city to recover from the flood and become more resilient to future flooding. Failure of the existing water main at its current location would cause catastrophic water damage to the PepsiCo Quaker Oats food manufacturing facility and the potential loss of jobs and taxes would severely impact the region's economy.

EDA's investment to relocate the transmission water main so Cedar Rapids could construct a new permanent flood control structure along the banks of the Cedar River provided protection to the Central Business District of Cedar Rapids. Without the investment, more than 900 jobs at the PepsiCo Quaker Oats facility would be in jeopardy due to future flooding events. Quaker

Manufacturing committed to saving 442 jobs as a direct result of the project, and contributing \$432,000 in private investment.

Labette County, KS - The Great Plains Development Authority in Labette County, Kansas serves an area that is one of the most economically distressed regions in southeast Kansas. The area suffers from high unemployment and low per capita income. In 2005, the Base Realignment and Closure Commission recommended that the Kansas Army Ammunition Plant (KSAAP), located in the area, be closed by 2011. The KSAAP was constructed in 1941 and was vital for the nation's efforts in World War II, the Korean, Vietnam, and the Gulf Wars, as well as the Global War on Terrorism.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$500,000 in Public Works funds to the Great Plains Development Authority to fund infrastructure improvements to the water delivery system at the Great Plains Industrial Park in the County. The total site encompassed 13,951 acres, of which 6,800 acres was transferred to the Great Plains Development Authority for industrial use and redevelopment.

EDA's investment to construct waterline improvements to the Great Plains Industrial Park is anticipated to create 75 new jobs, which will help alleviate the economic distress in the area. The proposed new mainline will not only supply the water needs of the existing tenants and eliminate the more than 50 percent seepage loss currently occurring, but will also be more than adequate to accommodate future tenants. Improvements to the water supply system will increase utility reliability, reduce utility costs, and increase resource conservation.

Pikeville, KY – Pike County has been devastated by the loss of coal jobs over the recent years. In an effort to diversify the local economy, they have focused on the health care industry. The Pikeville Medical Center has become one of the largest employers in the region, with over 3,000 employees to date. While the coal industry has declined nationally, coal production in Appalachia Kentucky has decreased by 80 percent from 2000 to 2015. As a result, a ripple effect has impacted area businesses as well as local governments.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,425,869 in Economic Adjustment Assistance through Assistance to Coal Communities funds to the Pikeville Medical Center, Inc. to fund the purchase of medical equipment supporting The Heart Institute as part of the renovation of the existing Pikeville Medical Center hospital facilities to equip the new cardiac catheterization lab. The Medical Center had a need to expand and was willing to commit over \$9,000,000 in private investment. However, they desperately needed additional funding to bring the project to fruition.

The project is anticipated to create 250 new jobs at the medical center alone with additional job creation from the support industries in the region. This project will assist multiple communities severely impacted by the declining use of coal through job creation, capital investment and reemployment opportunities. This renovation will allow for not only much needed job opportunities but will also provide heart related healthcare in a region that lacked adequate services in the medical industry for years. The Pikeville Medical Center is now a nationally ranked hospital, providing quality care to the region.

New Orleans, LA - Once a thriving corridor, Jefferson Highway Economic Development District in New Orleans suffers from a lack of private and public investment, fleeing businesses and many abandoned buildings. Along the corridor near the proposed site, a blighted strip mall occupies 30 acres and more than ten other businesses remain vacant. This region experienced multiple economic stresses emanating from natural and environmental disasters. Hurricanes Katrina, Ike, Gustav, the BP oil spill and downturns in oil and gas industry have devastated the area.

In June 2017, EDA invested \$1,500,000 in Public Works funds to the Ochsner Clinic Foundation to fund construction of an 8,020 square foot Center for Innovation. Key components of the Center includes a collaborative space for health innovation and digital health technology companies to develop, co-develop, incubate, and test new innovations. It will serve as the headquarters for a team of product engineers, physicians, nurses, health coaches, and technicians. A prototype lab and workshop space will exist to create and test the application of new technologies in a full-scale mock hospital room, waiting room, and exam room. In addition,

a state-of-the-art executive conference and training center for partners to showcase innovations and host community events including job trainings, business assistance programs, and educational seminars will be created.

This project will generate measurable impacts in revitalizing the distressed community. It is anticipated that the Center will create and/or save an additional 290 jobs over the next nine years. Nearly \$4,000,000 will be leveraged through private investment including the donated project site valued at approximately \$2,375,000, Ochsner's cash investment of \$1,200,000 and GE's annual commitment of \$400,000.

Walpole, ME - The University of Maine's Darling Marine Center is the State's central program for gathering, analyzing and disseminating scientific data regarding Maine's coastal marine environment and its ecosystem. This data is critical to the sustainability of the commercial fishing economy, including the lobster industry which accounts for \$500,000,000 in direct sales, an estimated \$1,500,000,000 in total impact, and 8,000-10,000 jobs directly engaged in lobster fishing. The Center's work also supports the fishing and aquaculture industries, the surrounding communities that depend on them, and affects the State's economy in other sectors such as boat and trap manufacturing, marine services and tourism. The Center's pier and laboratory flowing seawater system are essential for this work, but with aging infrastructure at more than fifty years old, it is severely deteriorated due to the harsh effects of saltwater.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$1,500,000 in Public Works funds to the University of Maine for demolition and replacement of the Darling Marine Center's 19' X 94' concrete commercial-capacity pier, renovation of 2,937 square foot of the Flowing Seawater Laboratory, construction of three new business incubation laboratory spaces, and the renovation of the flowing seawater system, including new pumps, pump houses and piping. A new commercial-grade concrete pier, updated laboratory and full-capacity flowing seawater system were necessary for the Center to be able to continue its essential work, but the University lacked the financial resources to complete the project without EDA's assistance.

The completion of the project will ensure the continuing availability of marine environmental and ecosystem data. This is essential to the long-term health and sustainability of Maine's commercial fishing economy. The Center estimates that this project will result in the creation of 50 additional jobs through business incubation and expansion.

Salisbury, MD - The Lower Shore One-Stop Job Market was an FY 2009 Public Works project. The facility has expanded with additional services addressing the need for new jobs in the economically challenged Lower Eastern Shore of Maryland. The area has historically lagged behind the State of Maryland in percentage of people employed and lack of a highly trained workforce. The goals of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee included the diversification of the economy as well as workforce development to remedy some of the distress. Extremely low incomes and high unemployment are a consequence of the industrial structure of the region and a result of a relatively low skilled workforce. The Tri-County Council (TCC) provides essential services to job seekers primarily through the One-Stop Job Market program in the county, an arm of the TCC.

In May 2017, EDA invested \$200,000 in Public Works funds to the TCC to fund the installation of new sewer and water connections to the Lower Shore One-Stop Job Market. The TCC of Lower Eastern Shore operates and manages the current water and sewer service at the Tri-County Building but current service levels are inadequate to meet the needs of new tenants, specifically the hospitality and food service training facility. The investment will assist in improving the expansion of a mass transit access facility for job seekers and address the need to provide job training and placement in the economically challenged region.

Completion of the project will support continued operations and expansion of the TCC of the Lower Eastern Shore of Maryland's multi-tenant facility. It is anticipated that completion of this project will result in 40 new jobs, 3 retained jobs and \$967,500 in private investment.

Somerset, MA - Somerset has experienced sudden job losses within the region and the County of Bristol due to the closure of the 235-acre, coal-fired Brayton Point Power in May 2017 as well as the Montaup coal-fired plant in 2010. These closures resulted in a loss of \$18-\$22 million in tax revenues, over 350 job losses and \$2.5 million in water and sewer fees. The community needs to rebuild the local economy, attract new development and create job opportunities for local residents.

In October 2017, EDA invested \$550,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance through Assistance to Coal Communities funds to the Town of Somerset to develop a Water Resource Management Plan to address needed capital improvements to their existing wastewater treatment facility. Completion of the project will generate new local and regional economic opportunities that will provide needed revenue to assist with wastewater needs through the establishment of sewer district with the neighborhood community of Swansea. In addition, EDA funds will be used to provide an update to the town's master plan which is over 10 years old and to prepare a much needed economic development plan to chart a new course and lay the foundation for growth and development.

Since EDA's award, the Commercial Development Company, from St Louis, has emerged as the new owner of the Brayton Point site with potential redevelopment plans for a deep water, industrial port and staging area for the off shore wind and power industry. As a result of these capacity building activities, Somerset will be strategically positioned to take advantage of the renewed interest and activity around off shore wind energy projects proposed by both Deep Water Wind and Bay State Wind.

Southgate, MI - Central Wayne County has experienced significant job loss and chronic long-term high unemployment rates. Common to the greater Detroit region, high-wage manufacturing jobs in the automotive, steel and power generation sectors have steadily been eliminated over the past decade. Since 2002, it is estimated that employment in the project region's manufacturing sector has decreased by approximately 30 percent. Most recently, the scheduled closing of two coal-fired power plants will result in additional job losses. In response, regional stakeholders needed to collaborate on the completion of a multi-jurisdictional, comprehensive and detailed strategy to assess the impacts of both past and imminent employment losses, identify development opportunities which will support and grow the region's manufacturing sector and identify ways to diversify the area's economy.

In February 2017, EDA awarded \$100,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to the Downriver Community Conference to fund an Economic Recovery and Development Strategy for the Downriver area of the greater Detroit region, including, and with emphasis on, the communities of Trenton, Ecorse, Wyandotte and River Rouge. The strategy will include the identification and assessment of the economic impacts of the decline in the area's long-term industrial sector. The project will engage regional stakeholders and the general public in the strategy development process as well as assess the relationship of the project area to the larger geographic region.

The completed Economic Recovery and Implementation Strategy will enable project area local government jurisdictions, economic development organizations, businesses, and stakeholders to best identify economic development obstacles and opportunities, and to establish a plan to implement selected actions. The completed strategy will identify clusters and individual firms with growth potential that could be expanded as well as those industries that could be attracted to the region. Activities identified by the strategy will help create project area employment and personal income opportunities, and an economic environment better able to stabilize and create public revenue sources.

Bemidji, MN - Located in one of Minnesota's most distressed economic development regions, the Bemidji Regional Airport serves an emerging aviation industry cluster and supports regional businesses with general aviation needs. Bemidji Regional Airport is an essential asset and its links to the rest of the world have helped the area overcome the challenges of being relatively remote from major economic markets. Recognizing the prominent role it plays in the region's economic vitality, area organizations have prioritized using the airport and its adjacent land as cornerstone assets in creating economic opportunity and development. With a current waiting list of businesses that need greater access to aviation services, future demand for the airport's available hanger space is anticipated to grow significantly.

In July of 2017, EDA invested \$800,070 in Public Works funds to the Bemidji Regional Airport Authority to construct two additional hangars, each measuring 12,375 square feet, as well as 138,000 square feet of new pavement aprons adjacent to the new hangars. The airport's existing hangars are at capacity and there is a demand for additional hangar space to accommodate expanding business support to North America and services to Canada.

The investment is anticipated to create 17 new jobs and spur \$7,500,000 in private investment. Long-term, this project will help the regional economy by leveraging the airport to stimulate

strong economic growth and development. The increased hangar capacity and improved infrastructure will increase general aviation activity in the region as well as improve connectivity and break down geographic barriers for area businesses.

Newton, MS - The east central area of Mississippi has recently suffered from disproportionate economic distress and job losses. Since 2010, and through 2016, this region had approximately 1,047 layoffs including the closure of the local hospital in November 2015, the ESCO Corporation reducing its labor force by 56 persons, and the closure of both the Avery Corporation and Peavy Electronics. Additionally, the Walnut Grove Detention Center closed in September 2016, resulting in a loss of 200 more jobs. These job losses for unskilled workers created a high unemployment rate. The proposed project is a joint effort between officials of the City of Newton and members of the Newton County Board of Supervisors which will assist with infrastructure financing for the new saw mill in the Newton Industrial Park.

In February 2017, EDA invested \$1,277,923 in Public Works funds to the City of Newton to repair and extend an existing rail spur at the site and upgrade weight limits on existing industrial roads to accommodate increased heavy truck traffic servicing the new plant. The project will impact the east central region by creating higher hourly wage rates in an area with high unemployment.

The 125 jobs anticipated to be created by a lumber manufacturer and distributor located in the Newton Industrial Park will help provide new employment opportunities for residents seeking

job opportunities. The project will also leverage \$85,000,000 in private investment. Additionally, this project will create job opportunities for area businesses who will contract with the city for the construction of this plant, rail spur, and roadway.

St. Louis, MO - The St. Louis area has been hit hard by automotive industry layoffs in recent years which led to the loss of more than 6,000 jobs and total direct wages of about \$900,000,000. Local machine shops and manufacturers are struggling to find skilled workers for their vacant positions and the shortage of skilled workers continues to grow due to an aging workforce with advanced manufacturing skills.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$2,355,418 in Public Works funds to Ranken Technical College located in the north central part of St. Louis, to demolish an existing warehouse and prepare the property for construction of a new 26,000 square foot prefab/shell building to house Manufacturing Inc.-St. Louis, to implement an advanced manufacturing program. The facility will provide technical education in the automotive, architecture, construction, electrical, information technology and manufacturing sectors. The College is in need of expanding its operations to provide training and incubator space for students that would include modern manufacturing skills, new ideas, technologies, and enterprises.

The operation will support pre-apprentice/apprenticeship training and entrepreneurial start-ups while directly aligning employer talent/credentialing needs with industry-trained workers. It is anticipated that when fully operational, 100 student workers will generate \$4,000,000 annually in products and services for local businesses as part of the integrated work-based learning model. The project is expected to generate \$2,350,000 in private investment.

Shelby, MT - Located in Toole County, the City of Shelby is facing economic distress, an aging population, lack of high paying jobs, and minimal opportunity for new businesses. The region's economy relied on agriculture and oil and gas production for many years. Industry production has plummeted in recent years and the County also experienced a declared drought disaster in 2015, adding to the economic distress in the area.

In June 2017, EDA invested \$620,000 in Public Works funds to the City of Shelby to connect the City's water distribution system to the Humic Growth facility. Humic Growth Solutions, Inc., is a successful local business that produces agricultural enhancement products and needs to expand its operations in Shelby, but the City lacked adequate water infrastructure to facilitate the expansion.

The infrastructure improvement will enable the business to expand its operations, as well as create opportunities for the City to attract other businesses to the area. The expansion of Humic Growth is expected to create 40 new jobs for the city and the company will generate more than \$8,000,000 in private investment, which will help alleviate the economic distress and assist in the recovery of the area. Providing water service for the proposed facility will also spur economic development opportunity and growth for the City of Shelby.

Lincoln, NE - Nebraska is well positioned to be a hub for sustainable agriculture technology commonly called AgTech because of its strong agricultural diversity, economy, and renowned research and innovation resources. An increase in the amount of risk capital is needed to keep up with the growing demand by startups. Educating and leveraging private investors would facilitate the strengthening of the innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem across the State. Creating a network of private seed capital and providing funds for operational assistance to potential high-growth businesses to enable them to be investment-ready by private investors is needed to continue growing the State's innovation agricultural economy.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$300,000 through the Regional Innovation Strategies Program. Invest Nebraska Corporation's project will reach the State's 93 counties, and will unlock regional capital to support a robust early-stage capital ecosystem that is currently lacking in the State. Building a coordinated cluster around agriculture, the State's number one industry, will lead to an increase in innovation, more investment-ready companies, a greater number of startups receiving seed funding, and higher wage jobs in the AgTech cluster.

It is estimated that 90 new AgTech companies and 488 jobs will be created as a result of the project.

North Las Vegas, NV - The City of North Las Vegas was facing several short-and long-term challenges to its sewer system infrastructure. These challenges threatened the economic base of the community and the ability of the manufacturing sector to expand to meet the job and income needs of the community. At the time of the application, the region's 24-month unemployment rate was 1.9 percentage point higher than the national unemployment rate, while the region's per capita income was 69 percent of the national per capita income of \$29,979 per year.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$3,000,000 in Public Works funds to The City of North Las Vegas to fund the North East (NE) Interceptor project. The project is a two-phase sanitary sewer project designed to provide services to the growing area east of Interstate 15 and the 215 Beltway and north of the Las Vegas Boulevard. The new system is designed to accept waste from nearly 7,500 acres of undeveloped or underdeveloped area. At the time of application, existing structures in the proposed service area were being served by aging septic systems that were inadequate for current uses, prohibiting business expansion and deterring new businesses.

The NE Interceptor Sewer Project will assist the city in overcoming many of its infrastructure challenges with a solution that will increase capacity and provide stability which is expected to lead to the expansion of several major manufacturing and logistics companies. It is estimated that the increased availability of sewer services due to EDA funding will enable these local businesses to create 367 new jobs for the region's workforce.

Concord, NH - The forest products industry in the Northern Forest region of New Hampshire, New York, Maine and Vermont has lost thousands of manufacturing jobs in recent decades as a result of automation, adoption of digital media, falling energy costs for substitutes and foreign competition in forest products. Paper mill closures coupled with low electricity prices have cut demand for biomass electricity and left millions of tons of wood without a market in the region. Thousands of acres of working forests are being rendered unproductive due to the loss of jobs in several industries including forest supply chain, logging, trucking, sawmills and other wood products manufacturers. In New Hampshire, five biomass power producers were at risk of closure, and throughout the Northern Forest region, paper mills have closed, sawmills have insufficient markets for their residuals, and wood pellet manufacturing plants are on partial production or closed due to lack of demand.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$526,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to provide specialized innovation-focused technical assistance to at least ten wood products manufacturing companies in the region. The Northern Forest Center located in Concord, New Hampshire is taking a leadership role in helping forest-related businesses as their industry navigates the long transition to new products and markets. To do so, the Center is providing technical assistance to wood products companies, developing market demand in the wood heat industry through marketing and business technical assistance, and fostering growth in the destination tourism industry by providing specialized technical assistance in marketing, product development and business innovation.

In providing this broad scope of technical assistance the Center expects to support the retention of 393 jobs, create seven new jobs, and attract more than \$1,600,000 in private investment.



Cumberland County, NJ - Cumberland County has a strong connection to the food processing and manufacturing industry. Located in the county are some of the most prominent businesses in these industries including Safeway Food Group, Inc., Perdue Foods, Clement Pappas, Buono Vita, LaMonica Fine Foods, Bridor USA, and Cumberland Dairy. According to the New Jersey Department of Labor, Cumberland County had 7,691 persons employed in manufacturing, making its percentage share of total county employment one of the highest in the State. Rutgers University recognized these strengths in 2001 when it established its Food Innovation Center (FIC) in the EDA funded Florida Avenue Industrial park in Bridgeton, NJ. Over the course of the past 15 years, FIC has provided a wide array of services to over 1,500 clients and supported the success of about 100 graduates that have outgrown the facility or required too much physical space from the outset. This is a testimony to the increasing interest and expanding market concentration of food industries and businesses in the region.

In October 2017, EDA invested \$2,500,000 in Public Works funds to Cumberland County Improvement Authority to support the construction of a new 30,973 square foot Food Industry Commercialization Center to provide flex-spaces for new food production companies in the county that have outgrown space at the nearby Rutgers Food Innovation Center. The Food Industry Commercialization Center will enable the county, the South Jersey Region and the State as a whole to expand market share and compete more effectively in global markets. This expansion is evidence of a strong and vibrant food industry and one that can compete domestically and internationally. By addressing these investment priorities and others, the Cumberland County Food Industry Commercialization Center is poised to establish itself as a worthy and creative investment that will promote job development, industry expansion, and collaborative innovation in Bridgeton, the County and throughout the region.

The applicant expects that the new facility will create 109 new jobs and bring \$1,500,000 in private investment to the region. The proposed center represents a model of collaborative regional innovation given the partnerships between the County Improvement Authority, Rutgers University, the Cumberland Empowerment Zone Corporation, and the City of Bridgeton which are all contributing to the success of this proposal.

Albuquerque, NM - The U.S. Department of Labor data for New Mexico estimates a 6.7 percent unemployment rate for January 2017, making it the State with the highest unemployment rate in the country. New Mexico had a late entry into the recession and has experienced a late exit and lagging recovery. Annual State venture investments dropped 65 percent between 2008 and 2013. Compounding matters, the Brookings Institution's Economic Recovery Monitor recently ranked Albuquerque 99th among the top 100 cities for its weak post-recession economic performance (2015 Q1). Brookings' Metro Monitor notes that Albuquerque was one of only two cities that experienced a decline in jobs from 2009-2014 (a "double-dip" recession).

In September 2017, EDA invested \$1,010,000 in Public Works funds to Innovate ABQ, Inc.to support the design and renovation of 28,000 square feet of an existing 71,000 square foot building for a bioscience laboratory incubator. The space will include wet and dry labs, open workstations, private and open offices, a training/class room, various conference rooms, storage rooms, and collaboration space. To reverse the unemployment trends, the region has been emphasizing a thriving entrepreneurial ecosystem driven by technology commercialization and new private investment with recent successes coming from the biosciences sector. To build on this success, an incubator lab and supporting services within the Innovate ABQ campus were needed to enable more bioscience companies to develop and thrive.

The bioscience incubator will be the spark that ignites multi-sector collaboration at Innovate ABQ and is expected to create 155 jobs, retain 80 jobs, and leverage \$2,500,000 in private investment. The EDA investment is critical in helping the region continue to evolve into a center for innovation, technology deployment and new job creation.

Bronx, NY - In August 2016, Governor Andrew M. Cuomo launched the New York State Grown & Certified program which identifies and promotes New York producers who adhere to the State's food safety and environmental sustainability programs, and assures consumers that the food purchased is locally sourced and produced at a higher standard. GrowNYC is a non-profit organization with 45 years of demonstrated expertise in non-profit management. For the past 40 years, GrowNYC has operated 54 farmers markets throughout the five boroughs with a mission to promote regional agriculture by providing small family farms the opportunity to sell their locally grown products directly to consumers, and to ensure that all New Yorkers have access to the freshest, most nutritious locally grown food the region has to offer.

In October 2017, EDA invested \$2,484,746 in Public Works funds to the Council on the Environment, Inc. to fund the construction of a Greenmarket Regional Food Hub. The food hub will address the pressing need for providing more locally grown produce to residents and increase business for NY State farmers. Currently, the GrowNYC Food Hub operates in a 5,000 square foot wholesale marketplace for small and medium sized producers, located in the Hunts Point neighborhood of the Bronx. The Food Hub has 41 producers selling products from seven States, and moves food to restaurants, retailers, senior centers, nonprofits, and community farmers markets. GrowNYC will develop a 75,000 square foot USDA cold-storage compliant Greenmarket Regional Food Hub to be located on a 135,000 square foot lot in the Hunts Point neighborhood in the Bronx. The facility will include a wholesale farmers market, a cold storage facility, a food-processing center and other infrastructure to support local food businesses. The new food hub will work with a range of small- and mid-sized farms, providing unprecedented access to New York City's wholesale marketplace. The processing facility will also assist upstate producers and processors to target institution and private sector procurement opportunities. In addition, the food hub will facilitate the expansion of farmers markets and youth markets in underserved communities.

The proposed project will allow GrowNYC to move its operations to an expanded, state of the art facility. The facility would create a permanent home for Greenmarket Co., GrowNYC's existing local food distribution program, as well as provide crucial infrastructure for local

farmers and food producers, create 131 jobs, retain 11 jobs, and leverage \$4,400,000 in private investment in the South Bronx.

Raleigh, NC - Eastern North Carolina has seen a significant change in its economic fabric. Two decades ago, the region was primarily driven by manufacturing, largely centered around textiles, apparel and wood products. Yet, over the ensuing years, the heightened mobility of products, ideas, and technology forced rapid changes in the manufacturing sector that shattered many of the region's firms. Southeastern North Carolina – specifically the 14 counties comprising Anson, Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Duplin, Harnett, Hoke, New Hanover, Pender, Richmond, Robeson, Sampson, and Scotland – has a rich history of entrepreneurship and a growing number of assets that are supporting new firm formation that is creating jobs in the region.

In May 2017, EDA invested \$750,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to the Carolina Small Business Development Center Fund to create a Revolving Loan Fund to serve small businesses in the 14-county region of Southeast North Carolina. In 2017, prior to Hurricane Matthew hitting the State and negatively impacting eastern communities, a large number of firms needed capital to meet expansion needs and this need was significantly exacerbated after the storm.

The project is expected to provide at least 30 loans based on an average loan size of \$50,000. These loans will serve up to 30 businesses in the region that will be able to start, expand or grow because of the revolving loan fund. The success of these businesses will support the progress of other businesses such as their suppliers. Carolina Small Business Development Fund has partnered with a broad array of regional and State partners to provide both capital and technical assistance to firms in the project region.

Fargo, ND - North Dakota lags in growth of jobs in areas of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) services, ranking 45th among all States in STEM concentration. Expanding higher education in areas of research and development and training employees with STEM skills will help facilitate innovation and job growth. Leveraging applied research and technical assistance to help communities capitalize on economic development opportunities is needed to foster innovation and to support commercialization and technology transfer for applied research to advance entrepreneurship in the region.

In July 2017, EDA invested \$100,000 in University Center funds (through the Technical Assistance Program) to North Dakota State University Research and Technology, Inc. to support the fifth year of a five-year EDA University Center award. The project focuses on providing technical assistance for new and existing businesses, product development strategies for new ventures, and entrepreneurial training and mentoring. Additional activities include identifying and providing technical support for STEM-based innovation clusters and enhancing the entrepreneurial resource network. Applied research activities in the fifth year will focus on compiling a comprehensive database of faculty research, identifying and solving specific problems in cluster industries, and increasing corporate interactions with applied research activities.

The project will identify, analyze, and maximize assets by commercializing intellectual property, utilizing specialized on-campus equipment through specific collaborations with

targeted private sector STEM partners, and enhance public/private partnerships with access to key talent and expertise vital to STEM industries. North Dakota State University estimates the project will create or retain 37 jobs and generate \$1,000,000 in private investment as a result of University Center clients achieving the expected results.

Mahoning County, OH - The communities within the Appalachian region suffer from two primary economic conditions, including the loss of traditional manufacturing and a reduction in industries and services dependent on coal mining. The dynamics of increased demand and decrease in supply of skilled advanced manufacturing workers due to retirement further emphasize the need for a new pipeline of trained personnel in advanced manufacturing technologies. This region faces shared ongoing economic struggles due to the loss of laborintensive industries over the past several decades.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,000,000 in Assistance to Coal Communities funds to Youngstown State University and the County of Mahoning to fund an advanced manufacturing training space for the proposed Youngstown State University Excellence Training Center (ETC) in Youngstown, Ohio. The ETC will help to address the region's unemployment and low income issues by increasing training opportunities for displaced workers and distressed residents who need enhanced skills to be competitive in the new advanced manufacturing economy. The center will effectively increase the number of people with in-demand advanced manufacturing knowledge and skills, and create a pipeline of skilled workers prepared to take on high-demand advanced manufacturing jobs.

The EDA investment will fund renovation and construction activities necessary for the conventional manufacturing training factory secure group project space, and instructional and general use space. A complementary Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) project will fund the high bay advanced manufacturing training space for the training Center.

Local businesses have estimated the training available at the ETC will enable the retention of 93 jobs and creation of 95 new, high-paying positions. Additionally, investments in equipment upgrades, and new and used machinery will combine with the new and retained jobs to result in nearly \$15,000,000 in private investment.

Oklahoma City, OK - The Aviation and Aerospace industry are critical sectors of the State of Oklahoma's economy. A recent downturn in another major industry in the State, oil and gas, has further highlighted the great importance of aviation and aerospace in maintaining a healthy economy in Oklahoma. However, in the midst of an economic downturn in Oklahoma City, caused in part by the decrease in oil prices, the city was facing another potential crisis—there has been a shift in the aviation industry from smaller to larger aircrafts. The facilities at the Oklahoma City Airport were not equipped to service larger aircraft and businesses looked to accommodate these aircrafts in other locations. Such a loss in operations would be devastating to not only jobs but also affect the city and the Oklahoma aviation industry.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,000,000 in Public Works funds to the Oklahoma City Airport to fund the expansion and improvement to hangars located at the Will Rogers World Airport. Having the competitive advantage of skilled workers and industry knowledge, the City of Oklahoma City and the Oklahoma City Airport Trust were confident that an investment in airport facilities would not only help maintain jobs in the State but also help the industry continue to grow. With a matching investment of \$2,000,000, the city and airport made a joint application to EDA for assistance. The expansion project will make improvements on two existing hangars, and provide the capacity to conduct aircraft maintenance, repair and overhaul larger aircrafts such as the Boeing B737-900 and the Airbus 320.

This EDA funded airport hangar expansion and improvement project will support economic resiliency in the region by continuing to diversify workforce opportunities in an area dominated by oil and gas, and improve conditions in the aircraft maintenance, repair, and overhaul sector. It is anticipated that more than 1,000 jobs benefitting multiple businesses in the local economy will be retained. By making this improvement to the airport hangars, the businesses in the region will improve capacity to grow their customer base which will result in additional jobs created. Finally, the project provides the base necessary to support a growing and promising industry across the entire State of Oklahoma.

Ontario, OR - Treasure Valley Community College (TVCC) was established in 1962 in Ontario, Oregon. Its service area includes Malheur County in Oregon and three adjoining counties in Idaho – Canyon, Payette, and Washington. The College has four locations in Eastern Oregon and one (Caldwell Center) in Western Idaho and serves as the educational and cultural hub of Eastern Oregon and Southwest Idaho. It provides education and workforce development services to 7,000 students annually. Approximately 60 percent of these students are residents of the State of Idaho. The region is rural, culturally diverse, and economically distressed. Malheur County has one of the lowest population densities in the country at 3.2 people per square mile. The low density and lengthy travel times have long challenged the region's ability to deliver relevant workforce development programs and services.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$3,000,000 in Public Works funds to TVCC to allow the college to leverage Oregon State funds to remodel and increase from 18,000 to 30,000 square feet an existing Vo-Tech facility in order to create an expansive Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center. An upgraded and expanded facility will increase the college's capacity to provide more opportunities for hands-on learning as well as space to introduce emerging industry-driven training needs. During its first year of operation, the principal curricula at the new facility will include welding and metals fabrication, industrial control systems, natural resource systems and agriculture technology. In recent years TVCC has successfully partnered with regional industry leaders, local districts, and high schools to start building quality career and technical education programs that connect skills and education to emerging industry needs in the region.

The new CTE Center will provide industry-driven curriculum and hands-on training that is specific to private-sector workforce demands in the region. Students will benefit from on-the-job training opportunities and direct pathways from education to higher-skill, higher-wage employment opportunities. In addition, unemployed and underemployed persons in the region will have local access to advanced training via video at select community locations. Before the EDA investment, the College's Vo-Tech program served about 150 students annually but the new facility will allow the College to add two additional CTE programs to serve 240 students in three years. Given the addition of 3-4 more curricula tracks by year five, the Center will be providing education opportunities and outsource services to about 300 students annually. This increased capacity will effectively double the number of well-trained workers available to meet regional workforce demands.

Williamsport, PA – The counties of Bradford, Clinton, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, and Union in Pennsylvania meet the distress criteria of less than 80 percent of the national average per capita income. The ten county investment region also suffers from substantial closing and downsizing of businesses. Over a 24-month period, more than 1,130 jobs were lost. Businesses reported job losses ranging from hospitality to the building industry, with a majority in the manufacturing industry.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,000,000 in Public Works funds to Pennsylvania State College of Technology to fund the expansion of the Pennsylvania College of Technology's Metal Trade Center (MTC). The purpose of the project is to expand the current MTC building of the School of Industrial, Computing & Engineering Technologies at Penn College by adding 22,000 square feet of space. The new space will house new classrooms and laboratories for the three welding programs at Penn College: Certificate in Welding, Associate of Applied Science in Welding Technology, and Bachelor of Science in Welding and Fabrication Engineering Technology. The project will lead to the development of highly needed skills in the plumbing, engineering, teaching and manufacturing industries. Penn College's welding programs is expected to graduate 138 students combined. Students in all three programs had robust employment opportunities with family-sustaining wage rates. Students completing a degree and taking jobs in the region have the potential to increase the overall economic well-being of the region. Full-time employment is expected to increase by 23 jobs. Another measurable outcome is the employment of an additional seven full-time individuals by Penn College to support the expanded program. Finally, twelve local companies have provided letters of commitment for the project, showing a strong local commitment to hiring qualified welders from the Penn College program.

Aguadilla, PR - The recent Aeronautical & Aerospace Institute of Puerto Rico (AAIPR) Market Study developed by the University of Puerto Rico's Business & Economic Development Center found that the facility is defining Puerto Rico's aerospace and defense sectors. These sectors are among the most important industry components in today's global economy and complement existing workforce training facilities in the Puerto Rico region. The aeronautical and aerospace cluster development on the island is geographically equidistant from Vancouver in North America, Buenos Aires in South America and Lisboa in Portugal. This position provides the island with a strategic advantage for business development with the future of Puerto Rico's economy hinging on its ability to innovate and to improve productivity.

In October 2017, EDA invested \$4,573,521 in Public Works funds to AAIPR to support the renovation of two existing buildings at the former Ramey Air Force Base for use by the Aeronautical and Aerospace Institute of Multidisciplinary Technologies (AAIMT), the research arm of the AAIPR. AAIPR realized there was a lack of infrastructure that supports workforce development in the aerospace and aeronautical industry. Both facilities have been unused for more than 46 years and were not built to resist hurricane and earthquake events.

Strategic partners and stakeholders include the City of Aguadilla, the Federal Aviation Administration, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Lufthansa Technik Puerto Rico and Honeywell Aerospace. The AAIMT facility will be a unique facility which will have five clusters for research and development that will be developed in phases according to market needs and opportunities, customer requirements from current and future aerospace businesses, and fit with the region's economic development strategies. This is a catalytic investment that will provide the next level of capabilities, job creation and global competitiveness that Puerto

Rico requires to grow its fledgling aeronautical and aerospace cluster. It is anticipated that the project will result in 100 new jobs, 700 retained jobs, and \$5,000,000 in private investment.

Providence, RI - Rhode Island has been plagued with persistently high unemployment rates and low per capita incomes in certain areas within the City of Providence as a result of a continuing decline in manufacturing and the transformation of the region's economy into newer, technology-oriented industries that have left many people behind, especially within the city's significant minority communities. While the region's economy has evolved, there remains a critical need to provide economic opportunities at all skill levels to address those pockets of poverty and economic dislocation. The availability of a city-owned, environmentally remediated industrial site within a poverty-stricken neighborhood provided such an opportunity, and was consistent with the Providence New Food Cluster Strategy and its strategic plan. It was also responsive to private sector interests in developing a hub facility for food production, processing and distribution as well as other appropriate commercial and small scale industrial operations.

In May 2017, EDA invested \$600,000 in Public Works funds to the City of Providence to fund new public infrastructure allowing access to the Houghton Street property and to provide the utility services needed for food production, processing, and other complementary commercial and light industrial operations. The 9.8-acre parcel was the site of a large industrial facility that burned and was demolished in 2000, and subsequently acquired by the Providence Redevelopment Agency and environmentally remediated in 2014. The property was made available for commercial use in 2017, though it was not served by an adequate roadway or utilities. The city's vision was to promote the site for the development of a commercial food hub that would accommodate production, processing, packaging and distribution for multiple businesses, several of which had expressed interest in the property but would not invest due to the lack of access and infrastructure.

The project includes the extension of the Houghton Street roadway, sewer, water and gas service to the site, and will support private investment and job creation within the community consistent with the Providence New Food Cluster Strategy. The City's analysis of regional food manufacturing enterprises indicates the potential for one job per 600 square feet of production facilities, or about 360 jobs when the site is fully developed and occupied. Additionally, the city expects more than \$25,000,000 in private investment in the development of the approximately 20,000 square foot food hub building.

Greenwood County, SC – Greenwood county was one of many South Carolina counties included in a Presidential Disaster Declaration as a result of the flood event that occurred in October 2015. The county received a record amount of rainfall during the event which caused significant damage including residential flooding, road and bridge damage, falling trees, crop loss and the breach and/or collapse of four area dams. While no significant, long-term job displacement occurred, damage to transportation infrastructure in and around the area and throughout the State caused costly logistical delays. In November of 2016, an international company announced that it would be constructing a state-of-the-art carbon fiber manufacturing facility in Greenwood County. The Greenwood facility will allow the chemical, pharmaceutical and information technology company to supply the automotive, aerospace and industrial markets in the region.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$2,620,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to the Greenwood Metropolitan District for construction of water and sewer infrastructure upgrades that were necessary to support the new carbon fiber manufacturing facility.

The grantees estimate the project will create 220 jobs and generate \$600,000,000 in private investment. The international company's announcement represents the largest initial capital investment by a company in Greenwood County's history. The direct and indirect benefits of the jobs and investment are expected to be economically transforming. The project aligns with cluster development strategies and diversifies the industrial base in a way that insulates Greenwood County from the impacts of future economic downturns that devastate more vulnerable industries.

Elk Point, SD - The City of Elk Point is a rural community with a population of slightly over 2,000 residents. It is located in Union county, the extreme southeast corner of South Dakota. This sparsely populated region of the State suffered a significant job loss when the Alorica call center closed in May 2017, leaving 260 workers unemployed. The city needs to bring much needed jobs back to the area.

In September of 2017, EDA invested \$470,959 in Public Works funds to the City of Elk Point to fund the construction of new infrastructure that includes street, drainage, water, and sewer installation to allow for the expansion of a local manufacturer into a new business park in Union County, South Dakota. A local cardboard and plastics recycling business planned to expand its operations in the city's business park. Several years ago, the business park had been acquired and partially developed by Elk Point Economic Development Corporation to help bring jobs and capital investment to this southeast South Dakota community. The manufacturer's expansion plans were contingent upon the city constructing road, water and sewer infrastructure.

EDA's investment to help provide infrastructure to the business park enabled the manufacturer to proceed with its expansion plans and create 18 new jobs for the community. This project is expected to generate \$880,000 in private investment. Completion of the infrastructure in the Elk Point Business Park not only enables the manufacturer to expand its growing business, but will also provide a significant opportunity for the expansion of other businesses in the City of Elk Point, the I-29 corridor and the surrounding region.

Decherd, TN - The decline in a once thriving coal industry has resulted in significant regional economic impact in south central Tennessee and northeast Alabama. The Tennessee Valley Authority's closure of the Widows Creek Power Plant in Jackson County, Alabama, resulted in the loss of more than 500 jobs for area residents. To compound Widow's Creek closure, Franklin County also experienced significant layoffs at a local mine, which operated specifically to supply limestone to the Widows Creek plant. The local economy of Franklin County and neighboring counties has long been afflicted by high unemployment rates and a low pay scale for those that are employed. According to recent Tennessee Department of Labor & Workforce Development reports, the region has sustained over 400 job losses in the last 24 months from companies that have had layoffs or closed completely. The significant loss of jobs has resulted in the need to foster economic development in the City of Decherd through support of growing industry clusters, particularly job growth through support of expanding industries.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$1,000,000 in Public Works funds to the City of Decherd to expand treatment capacity and make improvements to the Decherd Wastewater Treatment Plant. The project also received additional Federal support through a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission and a loan from the USDA Rural Development, as well as State support through the HUD Community Development Block Grant program. In order to foster area job growth, the City needed to upgrade critical infrastructure to support industry location and expansion, particularly expansion of the county's largest private regional employer. The automaker's expansion posed significant issues for the City's aging wastewater treatment plant due to the company's wastewater discharge periodically exceeding the plant's hydraulic capacity.

The EDA investment will provide the necessary infrastructure that will create an environment that will support future expansion plans at the company, as well as make the area more competitive in terms of expansion of existing industries and attraction of new job opportunities. The auto-maker's power train assembly plant in the City of Decherd employs over 1,600 employees regionally, and its planned expansion is anticipated to add an additional 50 new employees and leverage \$115,000,000 in private investment. Additionally, it will foster higher paying wages in an area that has suffered economic downturn due to industry changes, and support the continued growth of industry clusters that promote economic growth in the region.

Dallas, TX - The City of Dallas has seen economic growth fueled, in part, by a growing entrepreneurial eco-system that fosters the creation of new businesses and jobs in the city. However, Southern Dallas has not yet been able to reap the benefits of this growth. The southern area of Dallas has a per capita income of less than half of North Dallas. Over the past few decades, economic development in the southern sector has been so anemic that the Mayor of Dallas has launched his Grow South initiative to try to create business opportunities in this area. However, there were no existing support centers in Southern Dallas to help local entrepreneurs build businesses in the region.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$600,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance to the Dallas Entrepreneur Center (DEC) to create an entrepreneurial support program in the impacted communities. During a series of community meetings, citizens asked the DEC and city staff for an incubator that could help educate, train, and equip entrepreneurs in Southern Dallas. The DEC is a co-working space and a non-profit created to help entrepreneurs start, build, and grow companies through education, mentorship, and community. The DEC had seen major successes in its previous locations and agreed to take up the challenge of helping local entrepreneurs in the Southern Dallas region build businesses in their community.

The EDA investment will provide technical assistance to businesses through the creation of three new entrepreneurial centers in economically distressed areas of the city. By providing access to mentors, training, and networking, as well as the development of an entrepreneurial curriculum, this project is expected to create 250 jobs and generate \$1,250,000 in private investment. The great strength of this program lies in the notion that the benefits accrue directly to the individuals and families within the distressed communities. The businesses created will be owned and operated by members in the economically distressed area, who are also more likely to hire other members of the community.

Price, UT - Coal is the most abundant natural resource in Carbon and Emery Counties, with seven active mines still in operation today. The royalties each county receives from the county-owned leasing rights is critical to the economic stability of both counties. The fragile dependency on energy is greatly impacted by plant closures and drops in coal production that not only affect county royalty revenues, but also impacts all aspects of the counties' economies and employment. New employment opportunities are needed to prevent further deterioration to the region's economic condition.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$800,000 in Assistance to Coal Communities funds to FutureINDesign to support the start-up and operating costs for The Innovation and Opportunity Center in Price, Utah. An international product sourcing business has expressed interest in moving 200 light manufacturing jobs currently located in Asia to the U. S. if training and housing were available in the region. To accommodate the move and attract additional businesses to the region, developing a skilled labor force is needed to provide job opportunities for the local economy that currently relies on coal, gas, and oil for its economic survival. FutureINDesign will oversee the operation of the facility, housed in the historic JC Penney building on main street, and promote the center to attract employers by offering office spaces, employer-led training, and light manufacturing workspaces.

The center will provide access to technology and a newly trained workforce with specialized skills to local businesses. The center will be a highly competitive solution for corporations struggling to find adequate workforce talent or looking for viable options to return work, production, and jobs to the U.S.

Brattleboro, VT - Southern Vermont has experienced decades of economic decline like much of rural America where essential infrastructure for the New Economy remains elusive. This rural region, like many, is severely underserved. Long-term generational outmigration has produced distress within specific municipalities affecting approximately 12.4 percent of the region's total population. With Vermont being the second smallest State by population, the collaborative efforts of both Bennington and Windham Counties demonstrates an authentic "do-it-yourself" approach to regional, community-driven economic development.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$70,000 in Partnership Planning funds to the Brattleboro Development Credit Corp to fund the development and implementation of a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for the two rural counties of Bennington and Windham in Southern Vermont. The project also received matched funds of \$70,000 from the Bennington County Regional Commission and the Brattleboro Development Credit Corporation. Both are State enabled non-profit planning and development groups.

Key initiatives will be measured though a "SMART" framework (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Timely). Success of the strategy will promote regional actions, create an entrepreneurial environment and culture to enhance businesses, improve wage parity, increase the quality and size of the workforce, and retain and attract younger talent through expanding meaningful career opportunities. Since 2014, in Windham County alone, 480 jobs have been retained, and 170 new jobs have been added to local payrolls. Based on these 2014-16 metrics, the current co-recipients estimate that this strategy will aide in the creation and retention of a similar number of jobs within the two counties.

St. Croix, VI - The aging infrastructure at the Christiansted Water Gut Seaplane Facility lacks stabilization of the shoreline bulkhead and plane terminal embarkation and requires improvements to continue business operations at the Seaplane Facility. The Seaplane Facility is currently in a major state of disrepair that compromises travel access, passenger embarkation and reduces overall ridership. Over the years there has been a noticeable decline in passenger willingness to use this transportation route, instead opting for the inconvenient route of travelling between airports. The Christiansted Water Gut Seaplane Facility is a major interisland transportation hub for the territory and is the preferred option for business travel between St. Croix and St. Thomas.

In June 2017, EDA invested \$1,760,000 in Public Works funds to the Virgin Island Port Authority (VIPA) to fund improvements and repairs of the terminal area and shoreline at the Christiansted Seaplane Water Gut Seaplane Facility. Tenants at the facility had expressed to VIPA on numerous occasions that the dilapidated state of the facility is adversely impacting business and hindering potential for economic growth. There is an overwhelming demand for air travel to and from St. Thomas from the Christiansted Harbor; however, this demand could not be met due to the condition of the facility. Additionally, in 2017, following the award announcement, Hurricanes Irma and Maria exacerbated the conditions of the terminal. EDA amended the grant to include additional funding that would assist in the hurricanes' unfortunate impact.

The St. Croix Christiansted airport terminal is within walking distance to the business district, and travelers from the terminal can arrive promptly in the center of the robust St. Thomas economy. Improvements to the terminal area and shoreline will increase ridership leading to potential expansion of various services and job growth. Seaborne Airlines has expressed that the new improvements would have a direct impact on improved revenues and creates the potential

for future growth beyond the territory. VIPA has executed an exclusive long-term lease with one of the tenants at the facility, who has committed to providing services between St. Croix and St. Thomas with the possibility of adding ten additional flights per week. Additionally, it is expected that the proposed improvements will have a positive change on the overall local economy, lead to additional leased spaces that could potentially generate jobs and increase income contributing to the local Virgin Islands economy. The project is expected to retain 42 jobs and generate \$1,900,000 in private investment.

Roanoke, VA - The City of Roanoke has a total population of 330,918 (2010 U.S. Census) and is the largest municipality in western Virginia. According to the Alleghany Planning District Commission it is the principal location for the region and serves as the center for western Virginia's legal, financial, healthcare, insurance, retail, transportation, and cultural sectors. In addition to the sectors listed, the region remains strong in both manufacturing and distribution, with a significant presence of automotive, steel, and food production and warehousing facilities. The region has been hard hit in the past two decades with companies relocating outside of the U.S. looking for reduced labor and costs. The Roanoke economy has been impacted by significant job displacements. The proposed investment would assist in the construction of a production and distribution facility that would help replace jobs lost from other manufacturing, production, and distribution companies in the Roanoke area.

In February 2017, EDA invested \$1,514,280 in Public Works funds to the City of Roanoke to fund the construction of a road extension and improvements to surrounding infrastructure. Within the 12 months prior to the date of the city's application, roughly 690 jobs were lost with the closing of several company headquarters. This trend continued into the manufacturing industry with the closing of the Home Shopping Network's distribution center which will eliminate an additional 350 positions. The EDA investment supports the construction of 3,375 linear feet of the 26-foot wide Blue Hills Drive extension. The Blue Hills Drive extension project is located in the eastern portion of the City and is adjacent to US 460, 3.6 miles from US 220 and I-581, and 7.2 miles from I-81, all of which are major transportation corridors serving the northeastern and southeastern U.S. and the Port of Virginia. Additional project elements include landscaping, sidewalks, and lighting with other components. This investment will provide a direct road connection and utility access to the proposed 49-acre site of the Deschutes brewery as well as to an ancillary site owned by the Roanoke Natural Foods Co-Op in Heritage Point.

The EDA investment is anticipated to create 154 jobs and leverage \$95,000,000 in private investment in a sustainable food industry. Deschutes Brewery will provide not only significant local job opportunities and a degree of supply-chain and spin-off impacts, but also serve as a major boost to local tourism. The tourism component of the impact meshes with the larger city economic development strategies, also including active recreation, as the site is proximate to the developing regional trail and park system. Long-term plans include product export to Europe. Finally, Deschutes executed an agreement with the City of Roanoke to target hiring from the

city's most distressed areas, ensuring the positive impacts extend to the city's poorest communities.

Chehalis, WA - Lewis County, Washington, is a region that has been heavily dependent on the extractive industries of timber harvesting and mining. The timber industry was severely impacted by the reduction in timber harvesting in the national forests since the 1990's and almost all of the timber mills have closed. The coal mining industry supplied the adjacent coal fired power plant, the largest in the Pacific Northwest. However, approximately 10 years ago, the coal mine was closed and 750 high paying jobs were eliminated. Also, the coal fired plant is scheduled to close in the next few years, eliminating nearly 250 high paying jobs. The region is also prone to flooding and has recently experienced two Presidentially declared disasters by FEMA. There is a substantial need for economic diversification and employment opportunities in the region.

In August 2017, EDA invested \$2,798,648 in Public Works funds to the Port of Chehalis for improvements consisting of filling, grading, storm water drainage and culverts to prepare a site for multi-tenant industrial development. The Port had a 25-acre site that had rail service and utilities, located in close proximity to the I-5 interstate, and strategically positioned between the two major metropolitan cities of Seattle, Washington and Portland, Oregon. Several companies viewed the site but declined to relocate since it was not development ready.

The improvements will enhance the marketability of the site and industrial park by enabling existing businesses to expand while attracting new development to the region. This will lead to the diversification of the regional economy and provide greater employment opportunities for the displaced workers and underemployed.




Randolph County, WV - The decline in the coal industry has had a devastating impact on the economy in West Virginia. Over 10,000 direct jobs and countless indirect jobs have been lost since 2009. The mine closures and layoffs have had a ripple effect throughout this region and the displaced workers have very few options for alternative employment. One of West Virginia's primary employment opportunities exists within the hardwood industry. It provides living wage jobs to over 30,000 individuals and generates over \$3,200,000,000 annually to the State's economy. Randolph County is located in the heart of the West Virginia Hardwood Alliance Zone which consists of nine counties and over 200 hardwood industry businesses critical to economic diversification and resiliency in the State. The largest manufacturer in the region employed 630 employees and the company invested over \$62,000,000 annually through their payroll and purchase of lumber and materials from local suppliers. The Randolph County Development Authority (RCDA) requested assistance from EDA to secure a new warehousing location for the flooring manufacturer. The company's existing manufacturing facility lacked sufficient critical warehouse space which jeopardized a large number of jobs.

In September 2017, EDA invested \$2,500,000 in Assistance to Coal Communities funds to RCDA to fund the consolidation of their existing manufacturing and warehouse space with the construction of an 85,000 square foot addition to the existing RCDA-owned 750,000 square foot facility. The West Virginia Economic Development Authority loaned RCDA \$5,000,000 for construction. The expanded facility will become the distribution center for the entire east coast. The manufacturer has invested \$1,000,000 toward the construction and another

\$15,000,000 to the state-of-the-art buildout of this expanded facility. As a result of this project, it is anticipated that 60 jobs will be retained and another 50 jobs will be created in the first three years with additional projected job growth in the future. Additional indirect jobs will be created as a result of the expanded flooring facility being designated as the distribution center for the east coast.

Osceola, WI - Historically, the area's economy was largely based on agriculture and small manufacturing. Over time, an increasing proportion of working residents left for the Twin Cities (Minneapolis-St. Paul) urban area for employment, while the number of small family farms decreased. To counter these employment trends and supply available workers with the needed skills and knowledge to meet the demands of area manufacturers, the Village of Osceola made the strategic decision to invest in the region's critical need by creating the Osceola Fab Lab and Workforce Development Facility

In September of 2017, EDA invested \$500,340 in Public Works funds to the Village of Osceola to renovate a 10,554 square-foot building as a Fab Lab Based Learning & Workforce Development Training facility. Research, planning, and fundraising for the project have been underway for more than three years and has been supported by a market analysis and feasibility study. The Fab Lab's development has been driven by an increasing, critical need for a skilled workforce to meet the employee demands of local businesses, especially in the area's very strong manufacturing sector. Due to a lack of available skilled workers, some area businesses were forced to delay expansion, outsource work or relocate outside the Osceola area.

The Osceola Fab Lab and Workforce Development Facility will assist businesses in training the workers they need for the future and assist individuals in securing the technical skills they need to gain employment at local manufacturers. Through this facility, workers will gain new skills in cutting-edge technologies such as 3-D printing. Equally important is the opportunity for the

Fab Lab to provide test prototypes that could ultimately lead to new product lines. The Osceola Fab Lab and Workforce Development Facility will, according to recipient estimates, create 39 new high wage, high skill jobs and help retain 55 existing jobs as well as leverage \$975,000 in private investment.



Sheridan and Gillette, WY - Northern Wyoming has long been economically dependent on the energy industry. The historically low unemployment rates and remote location limits the available workforce for new industry growth not tied to the energy sector, although some small manufacturing firms have grown in the region. The recent decline in the oil and gas activity and significant downsizing of the coal industry has caused economic distress, but also provides an opportunity to train available workers and a pipeline of new high school graduates to support a more diversified economy. Many of the occupational skills required in the energy industries are also key to the manufacturing industry. Meeting the demand for skilled workers and expanding the capacity to train a skilled workforce is needed to help the region recover from the job losses in the energy industry and to become more resilient to economic changes.

In June 2017, EDA invested \$3,000,000 in Economic Adjustment Assistance funds to the Northern Wyoming Community College District (NWCCD) to fund the acquisition of equipment necessary to expand the college's workforce training centers at their Sheridan and Gillette campuses. Training in specific occupations aligned with the demand in existing industries will help the region adjust to the changes in the energy industry. NWCCD will train students as machinists, welders, diesel and hydraulics mechanics, electricians, HVAC mechanics, and in construction technology methods. NWCCD will also create an innovation center to support technology. Northern Wyoming Community College District estimates 1,037

new jobs will be created and \$5,980,000 in private investment will be generated as a result of the project, enabling the region to diversify its economy and become less dependent on the energy industry, leading to a more resilient economy.

EDA Leveraging Goals for Private Sector

Section 603(b)(2) of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended, requires EDA to include in its Annual Report to Congress a discussion of private sector leveraging goals set for investments awarded to (a) rural* and urban economically distressed areas; and (b) highly distressed areas.**

The following information is provided to respond to those requirements.***

(a) EDA's private sector leveraging goal with respect to grants awarded to rural and urban economically distressed areas

EDA has consistently shown sound results in attracting private capital investment in both rural and urban distressed communities.

In FY 2017, EDA invested 62.2% percent of its PW and EAA funds, including RLFs, in rural areas which grantees expect will leverage over to \$2.6 billion in private investment; 37.8% percent of the funds were invested in urban areas which grantees expect will leverage \$2.9 billion in private investment.

(b) EDA's private sector leveraging goal with respect to grants awarded to highly distressed areas

EDA recognizes that importance of private capital investment for successful economic development and recognizes that importance of maintaining significant flexibility to assist those communities that are taking the first steps toward economic growth. Therefore, EDA often makes prudent investments in areas where leverage ratios are lowest.

In FY 2017, EDA invested 41.7% of all its PW and EAA funds, including RLFs, in highly distressed areas, which, according to recipient estimates, are projected to generate \$1.3 billion in private investment.

^{**}For an area to qualify as being highly distressed, one of the following criteria must be met: (a) a 24-month unemployment rate of at least 200 percent of the national average, (b) per capita income not more than 60 percent of the national average, or (c) a catastrophic disaster.

^{***}U.S. Department of Defense reimbursable investments and disaster supplemental investments are not included in these calculations.
